- 1. Objective of the game: To collect one of each of the four kinds of 'Playing Cards', and then to finish in the middle (Note: the exact number on a die is required to do so.)
 Requirements: One game board (printable on 4 A4 size page sheets).
- 2 . Pre-amble: The target audience of this game is those for whom English is a second language. Native speakers of English will probably find this game too simple, slow and boring. I hope that I have devised and made a game that provides both a learning opportunity to non-native speakers of English, and some table-top entertainment.

3. Requirements:

- 3A . One game board . The board is formed by printing the 4 A4 size sheets that together make up the game . I strongly advise cutting the outer-most 5 mm of all sides of the pages . Then use glue , tape , paper , cardboard and the like to make a finished , playable game board .
- 3B. Counters of differing colors. One counter for each player, to be placed in the center of the board when commencing play.
- 3C. One of each kind of 'Playing Card 'for each player . So , for example , if there were 5 players , there would be 20 'Playing Cards' 5 each of hearts , diamonds , clubs and spades . The face-value of the cards is completely irrelevant .
- 3D . A set of the letters of the alphabet . Shuffle these well , and place face-down in the upper-left of the board , where ' Unused alphabet cards ' is written .
 - 3E. A six-sided dice (I know it should read 'die', but I prefer to use dice)

4. Movement:

4A. You may move in ANY direction on the board; up, down, left, right, diagonally. You must move the full number of spaces represented by the dice.

You may even change direction during movement in the same turn, HOWEVER... You may NOT change direction on spaces marked only with a cross.

You may change direction on all other spaces.

You may occupy the same space as another player.

5. Providing answers:

5A . All answers must be words that a native speaker of English , (with limited knowledge of languages and customs of non-native English speaking countries) , would know . Some adjudication element may be required here . Cities such as Tokyo , Yokohama , Nagoya , Fukushima are acceptable , but the likes of Niigata , Fukuoka , Nara are not . Names of people of any country are unacceptable – Michael Jackson , for instance .

6. Regarding the categories:

- 6A. 'hold', means something that you are able to pick-up. So, building, fire, lake, and the like, are out, but Q for queen is okay (there is no specified size to a queen).
- 6B. 'eat or drink': D is for 'dog food' is no good, because it is 2 words, and 'dog' itself is also out, because the consumption of such an animal sounds ridiculous to the vast majority of native English speakers.
 - 6C. 'living thing' may be something now extinct, such as dinosaurs.
- 7 . You cannot provide as an answer, a word that has already been given, by anyone, for any category.
- 7A. For elder, more knowledgeable speakers, you may like to have as a rule something along the lines of 'You cannot use any word appearing on the board', because there is a tendency by many to go looking over the board, rather than to think outside the box.
